The Christ - Child of the Year

Biblical scholars tell us that the innkeepers who turned Mary and Joseph away were not cruel and calloused to this poor, peasant couple.

The motif of "no room at the inn" wants to make a much larger point, described by Thomas Merton in this way: *Into this world, this demented inn, in which there is absolutely no room for Him at all, Christ has come uninvited. But because He cannot be at home in it, because He is out of place in it, and yet He must be in it, His place is with those others for whom there is no room.*

This highlights that there's never room in our world for the real Christ, the one who doesn't fit comfortably into our expectations and imaginings. The real Christ generally shocks our imagination, is a disappointment to our expectations, comes uninvited, but is forever on the outside, on the periphery and sent packing from our doors. The real Christ is forever seeking a home in a world within which there's no room for him.

So who best fits that description today? I suggest the following: Millions of refugee children. The Christ-Child can be seen most clearly today in the countless refugee children who, with their families, are being driven from their homes by violence, war, starvation, ethnic cleansing, poverty, tribalism, racism, and religious persecution. They, and their families, best fit the picture of Joseph and Mary, searching for a room, outsiders, powerless, uninvited, no home, no one to take them in, on the periphery, strangers, labeled as "aliens". But they are the present-day Holy Family, and their children are the Christ-Child for us and our world.

Where is the crib of Bethlehem today? Where might we find the infant Christ to worship? In many places, admittedly in every delivery room and nursery in the world, but "preferentially" in refugee camps; in boats making perilous journeys across the Mediterranean; in migrants trekking endless miles in hunger, thirst, and dangerous conditions; in people waiting in endless lines to be processed in hope of being accepted somewhere, in persons arriving at various borders after a long journey only to be sent back; in mothers in detention centers, holding their young and hoping; and most especially, preferentially, in the faces of countless refugee children.



They Still Need Fixing

After 20 years of counseling, pastoring and clumsy attempts at helping other people, I am coming to a not-so-obvious but compelling conclusion: Much of our helping is like hoping for 1st-class accommodations on the Titanic. It feels good at the moment, but it is going nowhere. The big tear in the hull is not addressed, and we are surprised when people drown, complain or resort to lifeboats. Most of the people I have tried to fix still need fixing. The situation changed, but the core was never touched.

What is the core? And how do we touch it? What does it mean to essentially help another person? If we can find the answer to these questions, we are coming close to what the world religions mean by true ministry. It is absolutely unlike any other form of helping. It has many counterfeits and disguises. What Jesus, Buddha, Confucius, the saints and the prophets are talking about is the **Absolute Help**, which alone is worthy of the name – the radical help that none of us can give to another. We can only point to it and promise that it is there. That is the first and final work of all true religion; all else is secondary.

Call it grace, enlightenment, peak experience, baptism in the Spirit, revelation, consciousness, growth or surrender; but until such a threshold is walked through, people are never helped in any true, lasting sense.

Ordinary Time

We're now back in Ordinary Time of the Church's liturgical year. The Christmas (& Advent) and Easter (& Lent) cycle are so rich with religious traditions that the remainder of the year often seems ordinary at first glance. The remaining 34 weeks of the year are in fact called **Ordinary Time**. This title, however, does not mean that these weeks, and the Sundays around which they revolve, are unimportant. On the contrary, it is during these weeks that the special character of Sunday is experienced. Except for four special devotional feasts of Christ after Pentecost (ie. Trinity Sunday, Corpus Christi Sunday, Feast of the Sacred Heart and Christ the King), no special theme "distracts" from the wonder of the original meaning of Sunday as the Lord's Day.

Very few religious traditions are directly connected with the weeks of Ordinary Time. The traditional colour used for liturgical vestments and church decoration is **green**, the colour of hope and life.

Did You Know?

- **Genuflection** is a brief kneeling on one knee as sign of respect before the Blessed Sacrament. Catholics show respect for the Eucharist by genuflecting on one knee or bowing when one passes the tabernacle or enters the pew.
- The **sacristy** is a room which means "holy place". It is where the sacred vessels, vestments and other items used during the liturgy are prepared and stored.
- A **tabernacle** contains consecrated hosts which are used at Communion or taken to the sick & shut-ins. The cabinet-like receptacle is kept locked and secure. A **sanctuary lamp** burns continuously next to the tabernacle, to remind us of Christ's sacramental presence.
