Converging Governmentalities: The Emergence of Catholic Residential Schools

Albert Lacombe OMI spent 65 years as a missionary in Western Canada. Using his life and times as an artefact, this talk traces some of the theological movements and ecclesial contexts that gave rise to and informed the residential schools system in the mid-to-late 19th century.

Home Sharing is a viable option for people who can live more healthily and economically when sharing a home together. Home Sharing offers mutual benefits, such as a warm home environment and affordable rent for the renter and help with chores and household costs for the host. Sometimes Home Sharing takes place informally between people who know each other. For those who wish assistance in becoming a host or seeking a home sharing arrangement, *happipad* is a program that has been adopted by our provincial government for screening and matching potential hosts and renters, managing the lease and rent payments, and offering ongoing support. The small fee for these services is *waived* during the two-year pilot. Are you interested in serving as an overnight shelter host? *Please contact <u>valley@connectoutreach.ca</u> / 902-599-2421 to receive a volunteer application.* Volunteers work in teams of 2-3, so people can let us pair them up or they can sign up with a spouse or friend.

Since our December reboot in Kentville, our team of volunteers have hosted 4-6 guests/night. Some shelter guests have moved on to housing, back to other communities or found other supports, but our goal is to support people towards the solutions *they* need. Just this week, we are delivering two guests back to their respective hometowns, one to a year-long recovery program and one to a supportive sober living community. We are seeking volunteers both for **Kentville** and the **new Middleton** emergency shelter.

The Empty Tomb

No one knows what actually happened. Those who claimed Jesus was alive again didn't see him rise and emerge from the tomb, they met him only after he had already risen and, immediately, believers and sceptics began to divide from each other, persons who claimed to have touched him and persons who doubted that testimony.

There have been sceptics and believers ever since and no shortage of persons, professional theologians, and non-scholarly Christians alike, who believe in the resurrection of Jesus as a faith event but not as a physical event, where an actual body came out of a grave.

Jesus' resurrection was both a faith event and a physical event. The Gospels are pretty clear in emphasizing that the tomb was empty and that the resurrected Jesus was more than a spirit or ghost.

For the resurrection of Christ to have full meaning it must, among other things, have been a brute physical fact. There needs to be an empty tomb and a dead body returned to life, not as some kind of miracle proof, but because of the incarnation. To believe in the incarnation and not to believe in the radical physical character of the resurrection is a contradiction.

We believe that in the incarnation the Word was made flesh. This takes the mystery of Christ and the reality of the resurrection out of the realm of pure spirit. The incarnation always connotes a reality that's radically physical, tangible, and touchable. To believe in the incarnation is to believe that God was born into real physical flesh, lived in real physical flesh, died in real physical flesh, and rose in real physical flesh.

I believe that Jesus was raised from the dead, literally. I believe too that this event was, as the rich insights within contemporary theology point out, highly spiritual: an event of faith, of changed consciousness, of new hope empowering a new charity and a new forgiveness. It was also radically physical, just as are all events that are part of the incarnation wherein God takes on real flesh.
